There is a 19th century two-story historic brick home of Col. John Johnston, former US Indian agent and canal commissioner. Costumed interpreters and craft demonstrators provide tours through this preserved and furnished home, the cider house and a unique two-story spring house which holds a loom.

Visitors will take a canal boat ride on a one-mile re-watered section of the Miami-Erie Canal. The Generation Harrison is a replica of a nineteenth-century mixed-cargo canal boat of the 1840-1850 era, representative of the main transportation utilized by farmers to transport their produce to market prior to the time when railroads began to fill that role. Costumed boat guides and interpreters direct the mule-drawn boat to provide an authentic and memorable experience for all (holds up to 80 passengers). This unique historical area enables guests to experience the joys of this former method of transportation.

You will enjoy a catered lunch (approximately \$10/person depending on your menu selections) at the Historical Indian and Canal Museum which houses authentic Native American tools, clothing, jewelry and other artifacts. It relates the story of the lives with the earliest settlers to Southwest Ohio. The museum is open April through October. Reservations required for groups. Restrooms are located inside the museum. Stillwater Prairie Reserve is situated along the scenic Stillwater River. You will have no problem finding the perfect photo opportunity in this 260 acre area. A circular hiking trail with segments following the river also passes through fields, woodlands, marshy habitats and shrub lands. There are three man made ponds and the Stillwater River provides fishing opportunities for visitors. Diverse topography and vegetation make this a perfect place for hiking, bird watching and photography.

Our first stop is WACO Aircraft Museum and **Learning Center** and **WACO Airfield**. A tribute to the WACO Aircraft Company's place in American aviation, the museum features the company's unique heritage and contributions to the industry. Exhibits depict the Troy Company's commercial and military aircraft production from the 1920s through WWII. In the 1920s WACO was the largest producer of aircraft in the world. The WACO Aircraft Company was founded by Buck Weaver, Sam Junkin and Clayton J. Brukner, who also founded the Brukner Nature Center in Troy. Your guided tour of the museum will include WACO Airfield. The tour guide may even be a pilot who has flown these fabulous WACO aircraft! And, depending on the weather, the possibility exists to see these beautiful planes in flight. Brukner Nature Center is a private, non-profit nature preserve dedicated to environmental education and wildlife rehabilitation. This 165 acre nature preserve has an air-conditioned, handicapped accessible interpretive building filled with hands-on displays, live wildlife and a unique treetop bird viewing vista. Brukner is renowned for nurturing injured, sick or orphaned native Ohio wildlife and then releasing them. A few that cannot be released back into the wild will find permanent homes at Brukner Nature Center as "Wildlife Ambassadors". Located near the Interpretive Center is the 1804 Iddings Log House, the oldest

structure on its original site in Miami County.
Staff Naturalists can tailor a program to suit your group's interests up to a 1.5 hour tour. Brukner Nature Center is open Monday-Saturday, 9am-5pm and on Sundays 12:30-5pm.

For a flat rate of \$45, a staff naturalist can do a 1 hour presentation in the Heidelberg Auditorium where group members can get up close and personal with several "Wildlife Ambassadors".

Finding that perfect photo will not be difficult at Charleston Falls Preserve and will be magnificent with the 37' waterfall known as "miniature Niagara" as your backdrop.

Charleston Falls is the most visited Park District property in Miami County with over 216 acres of prairie and forests. Over three miles of trails pass through various habitats such as Redbud Valley and the Thorny Badlands, offering explosions of color and varieties of scenic wonder. Uncommon plants such as wild columbine, walking fern, purple cliff break and rock honeysuckle grace the limestone faces of the surrounding gorge.
