DAY ONE

Located in the heart of Piqua is the town's historic gem, the beautifully restored Fort Piqua Plaza. This is an architectural treasure that was restored to the 1914 remodeled era of the hotel. Previously known and beloved at the Fort Piqua Hotel, it was transformed into a spectacular multi-use community building, housing the Piqua Public Library and a community banquet facility. Visitors can enjoy the magnificent lobby with the perfectly restored stained glass windows, breathtaking skylight and an opportunity to appreciate the well-worn gray Tennessee marble grand staircase. The library boasts of a large local history collection as well as genealogical research resources and historical displays from the Piqua and the Northern Miami Valley. The second floor houses a Piqua art gallery as well as visitor friendly Local History Department, containing items from the local museum placed throughout the building among other exhibits. Make your way to Downtown Tipp City where you will enjoy some unique architecture and history and some wonderful local shopping.

The Tippecanoe Historical Society members offer walking tours of the five block downtown historic district, including an old opera house, converted mill and dozens of historic homes. Reservations required for groups. There is a required donation to the Tippecanoe Historical Society. Contact 937-667-4092 for more information or to schedule a tour.

Downtown Tipp City offers some fabulous specialty store shopping with an eclectic assortment of treasures. The majority of the Main Street shops and businesses are housed in many original structures from the past, lending a historic atmosphere. Some of the shops you can visit include The Hotel Gallery, formerly a 3-story hotel which contains beautiful pottery and batiks plus 2 additional floors of work by local artists, Merchant 31, Browse Awhile Books, Hapinstance, Living Simply Soap, Scratch Bakery, Iron Dog Salvage and Topsy Turvy Toys. And, if your battery needs to be recharged, you can enjoy a cup of coffee at Grounds For Pleasure.

Just east of the Stillwater River, on the outskirts of West Milton, the Old Mason Winery & Vineyard is nestled in amongst corn fields and farmsteads. The perfect rural setting to unwind in. Come relax in their unique bricked tasting room, or on the patio with a vineyard view, while sipping on their handcrafted wines. Your group will enjoy a tour of the production facility and the vineyards as well as a wine tasting. They currently offer twelve varieties of wine. \$6/person for 1 oz. of five different wines. \$12/person for 2 oz. of five different wines. The tour and tasting can last from 1-2 hours, whatever fits the group's schedule. Your first stop for today is a tour of the Miami County Courthouse. The courthouse combines beautiful Greek and Roman architecture with five cast iron domes. This Masterpiece was designed in 1885 by Ohio native, J.W. Yost. Completed in 1888, the courthouse stands as one of the tallest structures in the county, towering 185 feet above the Great Miami River. The tip of the building is fitted with a copper statue of justice with bronze statues in attendance. Inside, the dome is guarded by a number of colorful visages representing cultures from around the world. Frescoed plaster ceilings, arches ornamented with representations of local agricultural produce, marble wainscoting, mosaic tile, and brilliant wood work also make the inside of this structure an architectural treasure. The historic 1928 Mayflower Theater, built at the height of the silent movie era, is now home to the Mayflower Arts Center. The Mayflower Arts Center is a visual and performance arts center featuring gallery and exhibit spaces, arts studio, and fine arts retail. It also houses a large theater seating 132 people and features a 30' movie screen and digital projection surround sound. The theater is available for lectures, art films, business functions, and private parties. The Mayflower Arts Center offers a variety of art classes and workshops for people of all ages and group sizes. Groups can enjoy a private tour of this historic Troy Theater, browse the art galleries, take a class, or escape with a movie. Reservations required. 

Next you can visit the historic Eldean Covered Bridge set amongst the backdrop of Miami County's vast farmland and the tree-lined corridor of the Great Miami River. Built in 1860, it's one of the only two covered bridges remaining in the county and is the longest "Long Truss" covered bridge in the nation. Today, visitors can still cross through the protected barriers of this historic landmark, both on foot and by car. Either way, the design and craftsmanship will no doubt take you back to another time in Miami County's early history. Doug Christian will provide a 20 minute presentation on the bridge and its significance. Corner of N. Co. Rd. 25-A & Eldean Rd.

There are almost 60 perfect backdrops across Miami County for that special, unique photo: **The Miami County Barn Quilts**. You can decide at some point or you can take brief detours to a few of them as you are traveling from destination to destination over the course of your stay. The barn quilts are 8'x8' squares that are colorful, hand painted folk art renditions of traditional quilt patterns. They celebrate the unique rural and agricultural experience in Miami County.
